Dancing Joy Program Notes

2 1.1

This project has been a huge labor of love, involving the talents and hard work of people all over the world. Those who danced, choreographed, invested, worked on set, translated or did any of a hundred other tasks—are the heroes. To our knowledge, no movie has ever been attempted to merge classical music, traditional cultural dance and global artistic collaboration, with sustainable filmmaking. We hope this is just the first of many such projects.

The idea began from a chance encounter, at the Dead Sea in Israel, in 2005. Our performing arts group met some Druze students on a school excursion and did a spontaneous performance for them. The students responded by turning on their music and showing their traditional dancing, the debka. As both groups were dancing, they beckoned in the watchers, until virtually every person in the parking lot was dancing together! Hundreds of people from all over the world were suddenly laughing and enjoying themselves—like *family*.

That was the moment I truly saw what "Peace" would look like.

For 12 years, this vision gradually took shape in my mind; a film that would let audiences journey to many distant lands, and experience the dance—the color—the scenery—to the music Beethoven wrote as his final gift to the world, his Symphony No. 9, with its powerful message of hope.

With advances in technology, what seemed impossible in 2005 became possible by 2018. We invited dancers through embassies, dance councils and many humanitarian organizations. We looked for three things: A love of their root culture, a love of humanity, and the desire to choreograph to the symphony.

The obstacles to mounting a film of this magnitude were enormous. At every turn, it seemed impossible. Yet, miracles happened, at so many key moments.

Just as Beethoven broke with tradition in creating a symphony with human voices and poetry as symphonic elements, this movie unfolds in the universal languages of music and dance. In reminder of his own loss of hearing, we featured American Sign Language Dance to help share the poetry sung by the chorus.

We filmed sustainably, protecting the natural environment and cultural locations with handheld or low-impact camerawork. We honored each culture's traditions and wishes throughout the filming.

This is not just a movie, but a movement. We believe it is possible to create art and entertainment that advances humanity and the planet. We see a vast global audience for films that can be enjoyed by all ages and ethnicities, and can remind us of our potential.

We put together these notes to give you a glimpse of the many talented artists who helped design, choreography, perform or produce the film. Each person helped fashion the entire whole. For this, I am very grateful.

- Locations were sought using geo-satellite mapping and technology
- Wardrobe was chosen by performers, with attention to cultural and historical accuracy
- Due to language differences, the director often "danced" the directions, to show the performers where the cameras would be, or which section of the dance should be performed.
- Many locations are historic and cultural sites, so many hundreds of visitors helped by staying out of the scene during each take.
- Dancing Joy is one of less than one percent of films with women in the key roles of producer, director, editor and color graders.
- Performers were chosen not only to represent humanity in all its diversity.
- Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 is beloved around the world, and has been associated with human rights, reconciliation, and unity movements since its debut in May of 1824.


